

















Church of the Holy Apostles has been an inviting and inclusive space since its doors opened in 1848.

Our building served as a stop along the Underground Railroad years before it provided a meeting place for the post-Stonewall gay rights movement. Congregation Beit Simchat Torah held services in our building for a long time, as has the New York Sufi community.

The landmark building has brought community members together as an election polling site, for English as a Second Language (ESL) classes, as a neighborhood composting site, for musical performances and theatrical productions, a warming center on freezing nights, and as a regular meeting spot for several local twelve-step groups.

This same hospitable attitude inspired parishioners to open Holy Apostles Soup Kitchen in 1982. They served 35 meals on that first day. With the opening of a food pantry in 2019, our daily meal output is now upwards of 5,000, and we haven't missed a day of service in 41 years.

People come to, and through, this space for many different reasons. It's an honor to follow in the footsteps of our founders, working to enrich the lives of everyone who comes through our doors.



Dear Friends,

In 2023, Holy Apostles Soup Kitchen and Food Pantry (HASK) marked its 41st anniversary of service. It was a year in which the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic presented ongoing challenges for hungry New Yorkers and an opportunity for HASK to step up in new ways.

Inflation and food costs rose, and the temporary boost to Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits (SNAP), known as an emergency allocation which were put in place during the pandemic, ended nationwide in February. Many of our guests who use SNAP rely on the Soup Kitchen and Food Pantry to fill the gap between their benefits allotment and the high cost of groceries.

With an eye towards meeting the need for food, we maintained distributions to the community we had been serving and we had asylum seekers in mind as well. Among our food distributions were deliveries to migrants arriving at Port Authority Bus Terminal and to newly arrived families at PS 11 here in Chelsea.

In total, HASK served over 2.6 million meals. It felt wonderful to welcome guests to family style Thanksgiving and Christmas meals for the first time since the pandemic. Decorated beautifully as it always is for the holidays, the food was served in the church while volunteer musicians and singers performed. Our staff and volunteers had time to linger over conversations with guests old and new.

Over the course of the year, 6,682 volunteers gave generously of their time, talents, and good will. At the heart of our organization, volunteers helped distribute groceries at our food pantry, prepare breakfast and lunch for our meal programs, and provide social service assistance. We conducted over 31,000 social service interactions this past year – which included clothing and reading glasses distributions, mail service, ID card printing, as well as computer classes to help our guests navigate their way toward improved health, housing, and jobs.

The need for food assistance and social services will remain high in the coming years. With that in mind, 2023 was a year of strengthening our commitment to advocating for New Yorkers. It was also a year of planning for the future, as we laid the groundwork for the launch of our choice food pantry in 2024. This pantry model allows guests the freedom to select their own groceries, lending dignity to a process which can be humbling.

Additionally, we've been putting together plans for a capital campaign. These funds will be used for necessary renovations that will ensure that our space is more accessible and better equipped to serve as a primary food distribution hub in Manhattan well into the future.

More than one million New Yorkers are food insecure, and our programs are vital. We're grateful for the community of individuals, corporations, foundations, program partners, volunteers, and food donors you'll read about in this report who bring our soup kitchen and food pantry to life through their kindness, empathy, and commitment.

## Meeting the Growing Need for Food in NYC

An estimated 1.09 million New Yorkers are food insecure, meaning that they had difficulty during the year accessing enough food due to a lack of resources. New York City's food insecurity rate is 12% higher than the national rate.

Our city is expensive, and according to United Way's 2023 "True Cost of Living" report, 50% of working-age households don't earn enough to cover the minimum cost of living.

In response to the heightened demand, HASK provided **2,606,700** meals through all our feeding programs, marking a staggering **660%** increase compared to pre-pandemic levels.

- Our outdoor hot meal distribution provided **266,652** "Grab and Go" meals every weekday from 10:30am-12:30pm.
- Through our Meal Outreach Program, we prepared 2,516 sandwiches each week for people who were unable to come to the Soup Kitchen. In 2023, the program delivered 130,848 breakfast sandwiches and bagged lunches to individuals experiencing homelessness who sleep in or around Penn Station as well as asylum seekers who were sent to New York City after applying for asylum at the southern border.
- Our food pantry continues to be the largest meal program at HASK. In 2023, **3,167** unique households made a total of **36,780** visits to the pantry, which distributed over **2.2 million** pounds of groceries.

HASK continues to purchase local produce and dairy from New York State farmers through the Nourish New York program in addition to leveraging and donating food that would've otherwise entered the municipal waste stream.

In rallying the broader New York City community to support our hunger relief programs, HASK cooked with. more than **485,000** pounds of recovered and donated food.

## **Spreading Joy at the Holidays**

In December, we collaborated with NYC Council Speaker Erik Bottcher's office for the fourth annual Holiday Toy Giveaway. Held in partnership with Governor Kathy Hochul's office and the School for Food and Finance, HASK distributed over **1,300** new toys to local families.

#### **Providing Warmth, Literally**

For the fourth year, the Soup Kitchen served as a Warming Center. When the city declared a Code Blue due to freezing temperatures (below 32 degrees), we provided overnight space and breakfast sandwiches for an average of **16** people over **54** nights in the winter of 2022-2023.



HASK was honored to be named a recipient of the **2023 City Harvest Advocacy Award**. The recognition is made to organizations advocating for policies and systems that will help New Yorkers.

In September, **Michael Ottley**, HASK's COO, joined staff from fellow hunger relief organizations in Washington, D.C. to advocate for the Farm Bill, which supports government programs that directly impact our soup kitchen and guests, and individuals across the country. The Bill authorizes food programs like the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (**SNAP**) and the Emergency Food Assistance Program (**TEFAP**).

## Our Campaigns



### **Campaigns**

To start the year, we held the **6th annual "Layers of Love"** fundraiser. The campaign generated over **\$8,931**, enabling us to supply coats, thermals, gloves, hats, and socks to **230** guests.

Our Summer Meal Drive raised **\$50,136** and we thank **Google** for a \$50,000 match. The Thursday before Thanksgiving, the Soup Kitchen hosted its 12th annual **Fast-A-Thon**, which raised over **\$111,234**.

Fast-A- Thon rallies supporters to create their own personal fundraising campaign and pledge to eat one meal that day in solidarity with many Soup Kitchen guests whose only meal is served at HASK.

Chelsea Market served as the Matching Gift Sponsor for **Giving Tuesday**. The Market matched all donations up to \$20,000. In total, we raised **\$36,073**.

Year-end donations were matched by the Shutz-Engel Foundation up to **\$60,000**.
